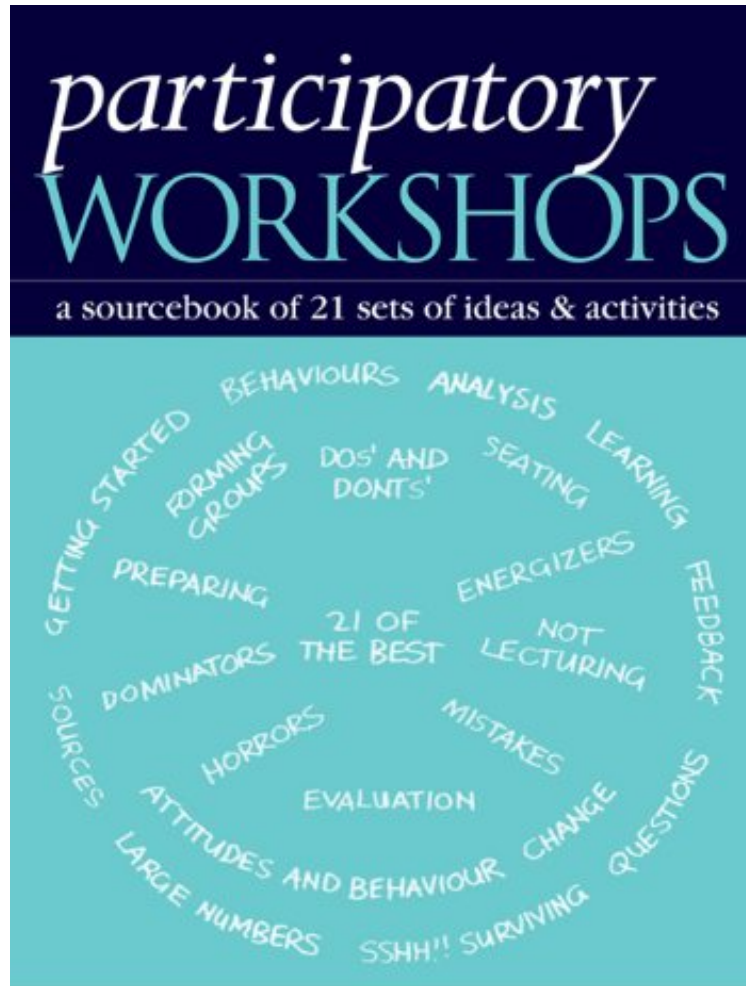


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Participatory Workshops: A Sourcebook of 21 Sets of Ideas and Activities

It covers topics such as getting started, seating arrangements, forming groups, managing large numbers, helping each other learn, analysis and feedback, dealing with dominators, evaluation and ending, coping with horrors, and common mistakes.
