

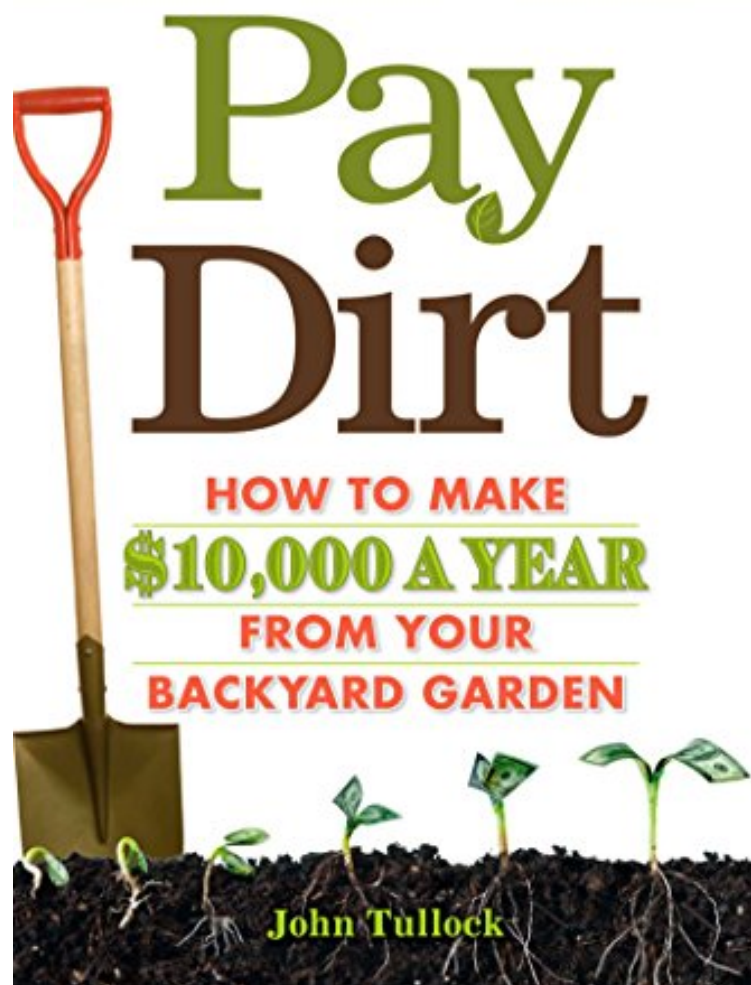

maximum profit and success. Though he covers a lot of material it lacks the level of detail and examples I was hoping for and relies on anecdotal stories or examples.
